



Vote For Thinking Ahead: A National Programme For Neurological Care

Ireland is at the bottom of the league in Europe for many aspects of neurological care:

- Lowest ratio of neurologists and consultants in neurorehabilitation per head of population
- Lack of many neurospecialist services such as neuropsychology, specialist physiotherapy and speech and language therapy etc
- Long waiting lists for those services that are available

17% of the Irish population live with neurological conditions such as migraine, stroke, dementia, multiple sclerosis, epilepsy, acquired brain injury, Parkinson's disease and others.

Critically, there is no overall plan within our health system to invest in and develop neurological care.

The Neurological Alliance of Ireland, an umbrella group for organisations working with people with neurological conditions, are **calling for a national programme for neurological care which will require the HSE to publish and implement its own recommendations for investing in and improving services for people with neurological conditions.**

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Facts And Figures About Neurological Care

- 700,000 Irish people live with neurological conditions
 - This represents 17% of the population
 - This figure is set to rise to 860,000 in 10 years time
 - As a comparison, 110,000 Irish people live with a diagnosis of cancer
- Neurological conditions account for one in five attendances to A&E and one in eight to a GP
- Ireland has lowest number of consultant neurologists and consultants in neurorehabilitation in Europe
- The cost of neurological disorders in Europe is €139 billion euros (respiratory disease €102 billion)
- The Irish mortality rate for stroke is greater than breast, bowel and lung cancer put together
